# BIZARRE OCCURRENCES

WBIR Knoxville reported that Tennessee's illegal substance tax is in full swing making drug dealers pay taxes on their drugs, and funding the organizations that are designed to arrest them.

Tennessee's law requires drug dealers to pay taxes on their product.

The taxes are held in confidence and are put into a fund that fights drug use in Tennessee.

Individuals caught with drugs who do not have a stamp proving that they paid their taxes will be charged with tax evasion as well as the drug charge.

Tennessee government reports that the law collected two million dollars last year.

Investigators in France have been searching for the identity of a murder victim for over two years.

When female remains were found during low tide in 2003, officials thought they had discovered the victim's body.

A New York police officer was shot by another officer while he was off duty according to the Associated Press.

Officer Eric Hernandez was in line at White Castle when he was assaulted by a group of men.

Hernandez pursued the suspects and apprehended one.

While Hernandez held the suspect on the ground at gun point a squad car arrived.

An officer then shot Hernandez after mistaking him for the aggressor. This incident is reportedly the first case of a friendly fire death for the New York police department history.

A 15-year old girl made up a story about a teacher's assistant inappropriately touching her and her friends which led her father to punch the man in the face, according to WTSP 10 in Tampa, Fla.

The girl's father found the teacher's assistant in a classroom and punched him in the face in front of 35 students.

After investigation, it was discovered that the girl had fabricated the story to get back at the teacher's assistant who had given her detention for pouring soda on another student from a two-story window.

A child was returned to foster care last week after officials discovered crack cocaine in a Rice Chex cereal box at his mother's apartment, reports the Spokesman-Review in Spokane, Wash.

The woman had regained custody of her son just three weeks earlier after officials discovered in 2004 that the little boy had ingested cocaine.

The mother is also being charged with unlawful involvement of a minor in an illegal substances transaction after taking the 3-year old to a drug sale.
